Salisbury City Council met in Council Chambers in City Hall located at 217 South Main Street. The meeting was called to order by Mayor Alexander at 6:07 p.m. A moment of silence was taken. Councilmember Post attended the meeting via Zoom.

PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE

Mayor Alexander led participants in the Pledge of Allegiance to the United States flag.

ADOPTION OF THE AGENDA

Thereupon, Mayor Pro Tem Sheffield a **motion** to adopt the Agenda as presented. Mayor Alexander, Mayor Pro Tem Sheffield, and Councilmember Smith voted AYE. (3-0)

RECOGNITION – BARBARA PERRY

Mayor Alexander read a Proclamation honoring Ms. Barbara Perry for her outstanding contributions to the City through her 40 years of service on multiple boards and commissions. She then presented Ms. Perry with Key to the City and a framed copy of the Proclamation.

Council expressed its thanks and appreciation to Ms. Perry for all she has done for the City and its citizens.

RECOGNITION – PLANNER MALIKIA CHERUBALA

Council recognized Planner Malikia Cherubala for receiving the Marvin Collins Award from the North Carolina Chapter of the American Planning Association. Planning and Neighborhoods Director Hannah Jacobson stated Ms. Cherubala is a tremendous asset to the organization and she is excited about the work she is doing to make the City a better place.

Council congratulated Ms. Cherubala and thanked her for all she does for the City.

RECOGNITON – HEALTHIEST EMPLOYER AWARD

Human Resources Business Partner Jennifer Silva and Administrative Specialist Claire Karriker informed Council that Salisbury received the Charlotte Business Journal Healthiest Employer Award. Ms. Silvia noted the City has been established as one of Charlotte's healthiest employers since 2020. She explained the award recognizes employees and organizations taking a proactive approach to employee health and wellbeing. She thanked the Health and Wellness Committee, the City's Nurse Practitioner and employees for serving as a driving force in implementing health initiatives that work to reduce health issues and support wellbeing for all employees.

Ms. Karriker noted the Health and Wellness Committee works to promote education initiatives, programs, and resources that inform, educate and help meet the needs of employees.

Mayor Alexander congratulated employees, and she stated initiatives help lower health insurance premium costs. Mayor Pro Tem Sheffield thanked Ms. Silva and Ms. Karriker for their work with the Health and Wellness Committee and working to educate employees. Councilmember Smith congratulated employees on the continued recognition.

Thereupon, Councilmember Smith made a **motion** to adopt the Consent Agenda as presented. Mayor Alexander, Mayor Pro Tem Sheffield, and Councilmember Smith voted AYE. (3-0)

PUBLIC COMMENT

Mayor Alexander opened the floor to receive public comments.

Ms. Annie Boone Carroll thanked everyone who worked to make BlockWork a success. She noted approximately 200 people attended, and she thanked Council for all it does for the community.

There being no one to address Council, Mayor Alexander closed the public comment session.

<u>UPDATE – DIVERSITY EQUITY AND INCLUSION STRATE</u>GIC ACTION PLAN

Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion (DEI) Director Anne Little presented the DEI Strategic Action Plan to Council. She noted the document is designed to address Council's goal to integrate diversity, equity, and inclusion into every aspect of the organization and is intended to be intertwined into the City's Strategic Plan, Council priorities, and internal and external policies and practices. She noted the plan was completed with the support of WPR Consulting.

Ms. Little explained the plan includes a vision statement, "A city that champions all dimensions of diversity and fosters inclusion for an equitable workplace and community and a mission to shepherd the City Government's commitment and resources for a diverse, equitable and inclusive workforce, workplace and community." She noted the goals of the Strategic Action Plan will be reviewed on a regular basis for progress and for relevancy.

Mayor Pro Tem Sheffield thanked Ms. Little for her leadership and her work with DEI. Councilmember Smith expressed his gratitude for a City that is working to address inequity and injustice. Councilmember Post thanked Ms. Little for her work, and he asked if she is satisfied with the progress that is being made and what can be accomplished. Ms. Little agreed, and she noted the work will evolve and change to help create a Salisbury for all.

Mayor Alexander thanked Ms. Little for her work with DEI and for all she does for the City. City Manager Jim Greene thanked Ms. Little and staff for all they do to promote DEI in the City. He thanked Council for its direction, support and funding of the City's DEI Program. He added the City is fortunate to have its partnership with WPR Consulting as it continues its DEI journey.

<u>UPDATE – FORD CITY MOTOR LOFTS</u>

Planning and Neighborhoods Director Hannah Jacobson provided on update on the Ford City Motor Lofts project. She noted at its December 5, 2023 meeting Council will be asked to hold a public hearing and vote on two ways the City can support the project.

Ms. Jacobson stated the project is located in the 400 block of South Main Street in the Downtown Local Historic District and just outside the Municipal Service District. She noted as a result of the City's Brownfields Grant an assessment was completed at the site. She noted Ms.

Tanya Haddock with Cadence Development has proposed to build mixed-income housing at the site, primarily for seniors and those who are 55 and older and can live independently. She added there is a strong partnership with local organizations to provide quality of life activities such as gardening, sewing, and golf.

Ms. Jacobson stated the project has a total of 64 units, which will be distributed between several onsite buildings. She indicated there will be an opportunity for new construction to add additional units to the site. She provided a project overview, and she noted the project is currently in the development review process. She indicated the project has faced financing challenges and is taking advantage of financing options that include a Housing and Urban Development (HUD) Section 202 award for senior housing, low income housing tax credits, historic tax credits, a traditional bank loan, and developer equity. She added the City will issue tax exempt bonds for construction financing.

City Attorney Graham Corriher noted at its December 5, 2023 meeting Council will hold a public hearing and consider adopting a Resolution approving the City as the issuer of bonds for the project. He explained the City will act as a conduit for the bonds and its only obligation is to adopt the Resolution and to issue the bonds on its behalf. He stated the City has no liability for the \$9.5 million bonds. He added the liability is on the investors that purchase the bonds and the revenue would come from the payments once the project is completed. He clarified the City will participate by issuing the bonds, but there is no debt or payment obligation for the City.

Ms. Jacobson pointed out the project has a financing gap. Ms. Haddock noted things have happened during the two years the project has been in the planning stages including an increase in interest rates and construction costs and the funding options are not enough to cover the total cost of the project. She noted Cadence Development is looking for funding sources for an additional \$1 million that is needed to complete the project. She indicated vapor mitigation needs to be completed as part of the Brownfields Program, and she asked if the City would consider waiving its permitting fees or using Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) funding to help with the project. She indicated Cadence Development is pursuing a Save Treasures Grant through the National Park Service, and hopes to begin construction in the first quarter of 2024.

Ms. Jacobson noted staff recommends Council consider approving a letter of intent at its December 5, 2023 meeting to contribute \$200,000 of CDBG funding to the project. She explained the commitment would be for future year entitlement funds, and she pointed out the City has available CDBG funds that will provide flexibility to support this project while also continuing to support other projects it has supported in the past. She indicated the funds would be distributed throughout construction and if the project does not take place the City will reallocate the funding.

Ms. Jacobson commented the presentation is for information only and staff will be back before Council on December 5, 2023 for the public hearing and to request its support of the letter of intent and the issuance of the bonds.

Mayor Alexander thanked Ms. Jacobson for her presentation.

REALLOCATION OF FUNDS – INCREASE CITY'S 401K CONTRIBUTION

City Manager Jim Greene addressed Council regarding the reallocation of funds previously budgeted for Social Security to increase the employer 401K contributions from 4% to 5% for all eligible employees, and to provide an additional 1% one-time lump sum appreciation bonus for employees hired before July 1, 2023. He added Council is also asked to consider adopting a budget Ordinance amendment to the FY2023-2024 budget in the amount of 12,000 to transfer funds from the General Fund to the Transit Fund to cover these costs.

Mr. Greene noted earlier members of the Fire Department asked the City to consider allowing them to reevaluate their participation in Social Security, and to fund the City's part if the decision was approved by fire fighters. He added Council agreed and \$335,000 was budgeted for the City's contribution to the fire fighter's Social Security. He added if the fire fighters approved Social Security it would be a recurring cost. He stated all eligible employees other than firefighters, participate in Social Security, and he explained the City pays 6.2% and the employees pay 6.2% to support the program.

Mr. Greene stated City Attorney Graham Corriber led the process and an individual from the Social Security Administration met with firefighters to explain benefits, costs, and to answer questions. He noted the required vote was held on August 31, 2023 and fire fighters elected not to participate in Social Security. He explained the \$335,000 that was allocated for the Social Security is available to be reallocated or to be allocated to Fund Balance.

Mr. Greene recommended Council consider using the \$335,000 to increase the City's 401K contribution to 5% and a one-time 1% bonus later in the year to show appreciation for employees. He pointed out the 401K contribution would be reoccurring and the 1% bonus would be a one-time expense and the funds would be available for Council to re-budget next year.

Finance Director Wade Furches noted employees are always looking for added benefits and value for their work and the City looks for long-term employees who will retire here. He stated firefighters and all other City employees, except sworn police officers would be getting an additional 1% added to their 401K. He explained the City currently contributes 5% to sworn police officer's 401K as required by state law. He pointed out surrounding municipalities are contributing 5% to employee's 401K in an effort to retain and recruit talent. He noted the additional 1% 401K contribution will cost the City approximately \$216,000 annually. He indicated Stormwater and Salisbury Rowan Utilities (SRU) have sufficient funds to absorb the costs, but the Transit Fund will need a transfer from the General Fund. He stated the increase would become effective January 12, 2024 if approved.

Mr. Furches noted staff is also recommending using the remainder of the \$335,000 in the General Fund to give a one-time 1% bonus to employees hired before July 1, 2023. He added employees would receive the bonus on June14, 2024. He stated the 1% bonus is a one-time event that would not impact the FY2025 budget.

Councilmember Post asked if employees are required to match the 401K contribution. Mr. Furches explained the City's 401K program does not require an employee match. He explained the

5% contribution is already in place for sworn police officers, and other eligible employees currently receives 4%. He indicated with the additional 1% everyone who is eligible for the 401K program would receive a 5% City contribution.

Mayor Pro Tem Sheffield stated she is pleased the appreciation bonus will be available to part-time employees. She added the goal is to make the City the employer of choice and this is a step in the right direction. She thanked Mr. Greene and Mr. Furches for their work on the proposed bonus and additional 401K contribution.

Thereupon, Councilmember Smith made a **motion** to approve the reallocation of funds budgeted for Social Security to increase the employer 401K contribution from 4% to 5% for all eligible employees and to provide an additional one-time, lump-sum 1% appreciation bonus for employees hired before July 1, 2023. Mayor Alexander, Mayor Pro Tem Sheffield and Councilmember Smith voted AYE. (3-0)

Thereupon, Councilmember Smith made a **motion** to adopt an Ordinance amending the FY2023-2024 Budget Ordinance of the City of Salisbury, North Carolina in the amount of \$12,000 to increase the transfer from the General Fund to the Transit Fund. Mayor Alexander, Mayor Pro Tem Sheffield and Councilmember Smith voted AYE. (3-0)

Any markers for underground facilities shall be flush with the ground. Lane closures shall be coordinated through NCDOT. AT&T shall participate with the State's one-call locating program, and appropriate locater tape shal installed to facilitate future field location. SRU requires that all new facilities maintain a clear horizontal separation of at least 48" (measured edge to edge) from existing utilities, and a clear vertice separation of at least 24" from existing utilities. All crossings must be identified/potholed prior to excavation. Engineering "as-built" plans shall be maintained by AT&T and made available to the City upon requested or relocated at no expense to the City (or State). NCDOT Encroachment required along all state-maintained roadways.

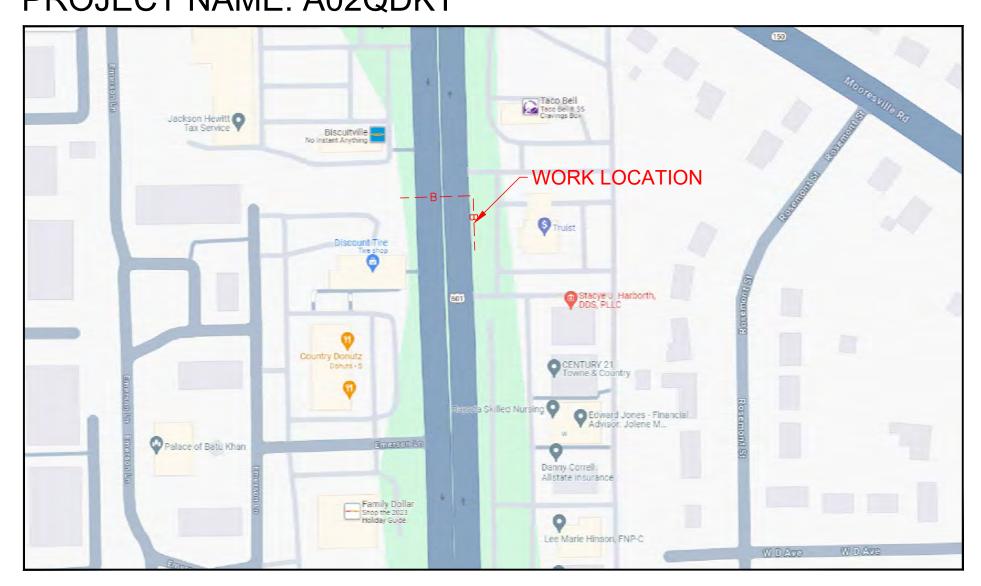

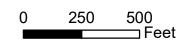

RESOLUTION GIVING PRELIMINARY APPROVAL TO ISSUANCE OF MULTIFAMILY HOUSING REVENUE BONDS FOR FORD CITY MOTOR LOFTS

WHEREAS, the City Council (the "City Council") of the City of Salisbury, North Carolina (the "City") met in Salisbury, North Carolina at 6:00pm on the 7th day of December, 2021; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Section 160D-1311(b) of the General Statutes of North Carolina, the City is granted the power to exercise directly the powers of a housing authority organized pursuant to the North Carolina Housing Authorities Law, Article 1 of Chapter 157 of the General Statutes of North Carolina, as amended (the "Act"); and

WHEREAS, the Act in N.C.G.S. §§ 157-9 gives the City acting as a housing authority the power "to provide for the construction, reconstruction, improvement, alteration or repair of any housing project" and "to borrow money upon its bonds, notes, debentures or other evidences of indebtedness and to secure the same by pledges of its revenues"; and

WHEREAS, an affiliated or related entity of The Mid-Atlantic Foundation, a North Carolina nonprofit corporation, and the Osceola County Council on Aging, Inc., a Florida nonprofit corporation (the "Company"), intends to provide low and moderate income housing in the City; and

WHEREAS, the Company has requested that the City assist it in financing the acquisition of the historic Ford City Motor Company buildings and the constructing, renovating and equipping therein of a 64-unit multifamily residential rental development to be known as Ford City Motor Lofts and located at 419 S. Main Street in the City (the "Development"); and

WHEREAS, the Company has described to the City the benefits of the Development to the City and the State of North Carolina and has requested the City to agree to issue its multifamily housing revenue bonds in such amounts as may be necessary to finance the costs of acquiring, constructing, renovating and equipping the Development; and

WHEREAS, the City is of the opinion that the Development is a facility that can be financed under the Act and that the financing of the same will be in furtherance of the purposes of the Act; and

WHEREAS, the Bonds will not be deemed to constitute a debt or a pledge of the faith and credit of the City, the State of North Carolina or any political subdivision thereof and will be payable solely from the revenues and other funds provided for under the agreements related to the Bonds;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SALISBURY:

- 1. It is hereby found and determined that the Development will involve the acquisition, construction, renovation and equipping of a multifamily housing facility, and that therefore, pursuant to the terms and subject to the conditions hereinafter stated and the Act, the City agrees to assist the Company in every reasonable way to issue bonds to finance the acquisition, construction, renovation and equipping of the Development, and, in particular, to undertake the issuance of the City's multifamily housing revenue bonds (the "Bonds") in an amount now estimated not to exceed Fifteen Million Dollars (\$15,000,000) to provide all or part of the cost of the Development.
- 2. The City intends that the adoption of this resolution be considered as "official action" toward the issuance of the Bonds within the meaning of the regulations issued by the Internal Revenue

Service pursuant to Section 1.150-2 of the Treasury Regulations issued under the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended (the "Code").

- 3. The Bonds shall be issued in such series and amounts and upon such terms and conditions as are mutually agreed upon between the City and the Company. The City and the Company shall enter into a "financing agreement" pursuant to the Act for a term and upon payments sufficient to pay the principal of, premium if any, and interest on the Bonds and to pay all of the expenses of the City in connection with the Bonds and the Development. The Bonds will be issued pursuant to an indenture or security agreement between the City and a trustee (the "Trustee") or the bondholder which will set forth the form and terms of the Bonds and will assign to the Trustee for the benefit of the holders of the Bonds, or directly to the bondholder, the City's rights to payment of fees and expenses and indemnification. The Bonds shall not be deemed to constitute a debt or a pledge of the faith and credit of the State of North Carolina or any political subdivision or agency thereof, including the City, but shall be payable solely from the revenues and other funds provided under the proposed agreements with the Company.
- 4. The City hereby authorizes the Company to proceed, upon the prior advice, consent and approval of bond counsel and the City's counsel, to obtain approvals in connection with the issuance and sale of the Bonds and to obtain an allocation of a sufficient amount of the State of North Carolina's "private activity bond limit", as required by Section 146 of the Code and as defined in Section 146 of the Code, for the Bonds.
- 5. It having been represented to the City that it is desirable to proceed with the acquisition, construction, renovation and equipping of the Development, the City agrees that the Company may proceed with plans for such acquisition, construction, renovation and equipping, enter into contracts for the same, and take such other steps as it may deem appropriate in connection therewith, provided that nothing herein shall be deemed to authorize the Company to obligate the City without its written consent in each instance to the payment of any monies or the performance of any act in connection with the Development and no such consent shall be implied from the City's adoption of this resolution. The Company has indicated that it expects to incur and pay expenses relating to the Development prior to the issuance of the Bonds and expects to reimburse those expenditures with proceeds of the Bonds. The City agrees that the Company may be reimbursed from the proceeds of the Bonds, if and when issued, for all qualifying costs so incurred as permitted by Treasury Regulations Section 1.150-2.
- 6. All obligations hereunder of the City are subject to the further agreement of the City and the Company to terms for the issuance, sale and delivery of the Bonds and the execution of a financing agreement, indenture or security agreement and other documents and agreements necessary or desirable for the issuance of the Bonds. The City has not authorized and does not authorize the expenditure of any funds or monies of the City from any source other than the proceeds of the Bonds. All costs and expenses in connection with the financing and the acquisition, construction, renovation and equipping of the Development, including the reasonable fees and expenses of the City's counsel, bond counsel and the agent or underwriter for the sale of the Bonds, shall be paid from the proceeds of the Bonds or by the Company, but if for any reason the Bonds are not issued, all such expenses shall be paid by the Company and the City shall have no responsibility therefor. It is understood and agreed by the City and the Company that nothing contained in this resolution shall be construed or interpreted to create any personal liability of the officers or council members from time to time of the City.
- 7. The officers of the City are hereby authorized and directed to take all actions in furtherance of the resolution and the issuance of the Bonds.

- 8. The City hereby approves McGuireWoods LLP, Raleigh, North Carolina, to act as bond counsel for the Bonds.
 - 9. This resolution shall take effect immediately.

RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE ISSUANCE AND SALE OF MULTIFAMILY HOUSING REVENUE BONDS (FORD CITY MOTOR LOFTS), SERIES 2023

WHEREAS, the City Council of the City of Salisbury (the "City") met in Salisbury, North Carolina at 6:00 p.m. on the 5th day of December, 2023; and

WHEREAS, pursuant to Section 160D-1311(b) of the General Statutes of North Carolina, the City is granted the power to exercise directly the powers of a housing authority organized pursuant to the North Carolina Housing Authorities Law, Article 1 of Chapter 157 of the General Statutes of North Carolina, as amended (the "Act"); and

WHEREAS, the Act in N.C.G.S. § 157-9 gives the City, acting as a housing authority, the power "to provide for the construction, reconstruction, improvement, alteration or repair of any housing project" and "to borrow money upon its bonds, notes, debentures or other evidences of indebtedness and to secure the same by pledges of its revenues"; and

WHEREAS, Ford City Motor Lofts, LP, a North Carolina limited partnership (the "Borrower"), has requested that the City assist it in financing a portion of the cost of the acquisition, construction, renovation and equipping of a 64-unit qualified residential rental project to be known as Ford City Motor Lofts and located at 419 South Main Street in the City (the "Project"); and

WHEREAS, the City proposes to provide the financing for the Project by the issuance of its Multifamily Housing Revenue Bonds (Ford City Motor Lofts), Series 2023, in an aggregate principal amount not to exceed \$9,500,000 (the "Bonds"); and

WHEREAS, portions of the cost of the Project will be financed with the proceeds of a loan from Merchants Bank of Indiana to the Borrower and loans from Osceola Council on Aging, Inc., a Florida non-profit corporation, to the Borrower; and

WHEREAS, a portion of the cost of the Project will be financed with funds provided by a tax credit investor as a result of the purchase of 4% low income housing tax credits available under Section 42 of the Internal Revenue Code of 1986, as amended (the "Code"); and

WHEREAS, the Borrower has received an allocation of volume cap for the Bonds and the Project from the North Carolina Housing Finance Agency and the North Carolina Federal Tax Reform Allocation Committee as required by Section 146 of the Code; and

WHEREAS, Section 147(f) of the Code, requires that any bonds issued by the City for the Project may only be issued after approval of the plan of financing by the City following a public hearing with respect to such plan; and

WHEREAS, on this day the City held a public hearing with respect to the issuance of the Bonds to finance, in part, the Project (as evidenced by the Certificate and Summary of Public Hearing attached hereto); and

WHEREAS, the City proposes to authorize and, where applicable, execute the following instruments to carry out the transactions described above (the "Documents"):

- (a) Trust Indenture (the "Indenture"), between the City and The Huntington National Bank, as trustee (the "Trustee"), authorizing the issuance of the Bonds and providing for the terms and details thereof and the security therefor, together with the form of the Bonds attached thereto;
- (b) Loan Agreement (the "Loan Agreement"), between the City and the Borrower, providing for the terms and conditions pursuant to which the loan of the proceeds of the Bonds will be made by the City to the Borrower, together with a Promissory Note from the Borrower to the City, which the City will assign to the Trustee;
- (c) Regulatory Agreement and Declaration of Restrictive Covenants (the "Regulatory Agreement"), by the Borrower for the benefit of the City and the Trustee, pursuant to which the Borrower agrees to comply with the requirements of the Code relating to low and moderate income housing;
- (d) Preliminary Official Statement (the "Preliminary Official Statement") relating to the offering and sale of the Bonds; and
- (e) Bond Purchase Agreement to be dated the date of the sale of the Bonds (the "Bond Purchase Agreement") among the Borrower, the City and Stifel, Nicolaus & Company, Incorporated (the "Underwriter"), providing for the issuance and sale by the City and the purchase by the Underwriter of the Bonds; and

WHEREAS, the City will not in any event have any liability or responsibility whatsoever for the repayment of the Bonds, or for any costs or expenses incurred in connection with the issuance of the Bonds or the acquisition, construction, renovation, equipping or operation of the Project, and neither the faith and credit nor the taxing power of the City is pledged to the payment of the principal of or interest on the Bonds;

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF SALISBURY, NORTH CAROLINA:

- 1. The City hereby determines to provide financing to the Borrower for the acquisition, construction, renovation and equipping of the Project through the issuance of the Bonds pursuant to the North Carolina Housing Authorities Law, Article 1 of Chapter 157 of the General Statutes of North Carolina, as amended, and Section 160D-1311(b) of the General Statutes of North Carolina, as amended, the loan of the proceeds thereof and the advance of such proceeds to the Borrower in accordance with the Loan Agreement.
- 2. The City hereby authorizes the issuance and sale of the Bonds pursuant to the Indenture and in accordance with the terms set forth in the Bond Purchase Agreement and the Indenture. The Bonds will bear interest at the rates and will mature, be subject to mandatory tender and be redeemed in the years and amounts all as set forth in the Indenture; provided, however, that the aggregate principal amount of the Bonds shall not exceed \$9,500,000.

- 3. The issuance of the Bonds to finance a portion of the cost of the Project in an amount not to exceed \$9,500,000 is hereby approved for purposes of Section 147(f) of the Code.
- 4. Each of the Mayor, the City Manager, the City Clerk or their respective designees are hereby authorized and directed to execute and deliver the Indenture, the Loan Agreement, the Regulatory Agreement and the Bond Purchase Agreement to the other parties thereto.
- 5. Each of the Mayor and the City Manager or their respective designees are hereby authorized and directed to execute and deliver the Bonds in the manner and subject to the conditions provided in the Indenture to the Trustee for authentication and to cause the Bonds so executed and authenticated to be delivered to or for the account of the Underwriter upon payment of the purchase price therefor as provided in the Bond Purchase Agreement.
- 6. The distribution of the Preliminary Official Statement by the Underwriter to prospective purchasers of the Bonds is hereby approved. The City is authorized to deem the Preliminary Official Statement to be "final" within the meaning of Rule 15c2-12 of the Rules and Regulations promulgated under the Securities Exchange Act of 1934, as amended. The Mayor and the City Manager or their respective designees are hereby authorized and directed to deliver the final Official Statement (in substantially the form of the Preliminary Official Statement, but incorporating the final terms and details of the Bonds) to the Underwriter and the Underwriter is hereby authorized and directed to distribute the Official Statement to the purchasers of the Bonds.
- 7. The Documents and the Bonds shall be in substantially the forms previously reviewed by staff and described herein, which are hereby approved, with such completions, omissions, insertions and changes as may be necessary to reflect the final terms of the Bonds, including any changes that may be required by any rating agency that is rating the Bonds, any changes in dates as may be required to reflect the date of the actual closing, and as otherwise approved by the officers of the City executing them after consultation with bond counsel and counsel to the City, their execution to constitute conclusive evidence of their approval of any such completions, omissions, insertions and changes.
- 8. Any authorization made hereby to the officers of the City to execute a Document shall include authorization to each of the Mayor and City Manager or their respective designees to execute the document, authorization to the City Clerk or any Deputy City Clerk to affix the seal of the City to such document and attest such seal if necessary, and, where appropriate, to deliver it to the other parties thereto, all in the manner provided in the Documents.
- 9. Such officers are hereby authorized and directed to execute and deliver any and all other documents, agreements, instruments, and certificates in the name and on behalf of the City and to take such other actions on behalf of the City as may be necessary or desirable to the issuance of the Bonds, including but not limited to a nonarbitrage certificate, tax forms and other certificates. All other acts of the officers of the City previously taken or to be taken that are in conformity with the purposes and intent of this resolution and in furtherance of the undertaking of the Project and the issuance and sale of the Bonds are hereby authorized, ratified, confirmed and approved.

WHEREAS, a petition to rezone the property described herein was properly filed by the City of Salisbury; and

SECTION 3. DEVELOPMENT CONDITIONS: That the following conditions are applicable to the development proposal associated with this Ordinance (see above, Section 2, Development Documents) within the Conditional District (CD) Overlay:

- Only 4 parking spaces are required as a design alternative to Section 10.3.
- No parking lot connections are required as a design alternative to Section 10.6.
- Front setback of 5 feet, side setback of 9% of the lot width, and rear setback of 5 feet, as a design alternative to Section 5.16.

SECTION 4. DEVELOPMENT DOCUMENTS: That as permitted by the Land Development Ordinance, the development documents associated with this Conditional District (CD) Overlay may establish alternatives to specific provisions of the Land Development Ordinance; however, where

alternatives are not provided, those and all other applicable Land Development Ordinance provisions remain applicable for any and all development within this Conditional District (CD) Overlay.

SECTION 5. That improvements (public and/or private) for Stormwater drainage, streets, water and sewer shall be designed and installed in accordance with applicable City and Salisbury-Rowan Utilities standards and policies. Layouts shown on the approved, stamped, and signed Development Documents are considered schematic and may require administrative revision(s) upon review of engineering drawings or details (Construction Documents).

SECTION 6. That all Ordinances, or parts of Ordinances, in conflict with this Ordinance are hereby repealed to the extent of such conflict.

SECTION 7. That this Ordinance shall be effective from and after its passage.

Currently, North Carolina has an extensive waitlist for permanent supportive housing and housing financial assistance through the Continuum of Care system. Last year, 21 of Rowan County guests were on our region's prioritized waiting list. Just two permanent supportive housing units became available but went to guests in other counties. Currently, there are 10 Rowan County guests who qualifies for permanent supportive housing, and they have been on the list ranging from 6 to 18 months. The First Horizon development will allow the Rowan Helping Ministries to expand from 3 to 13 permanent supportive housing units.

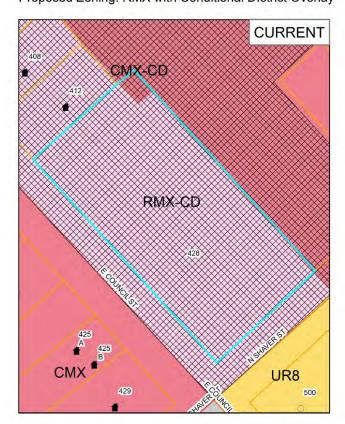

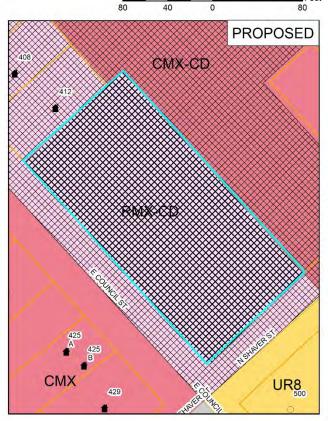

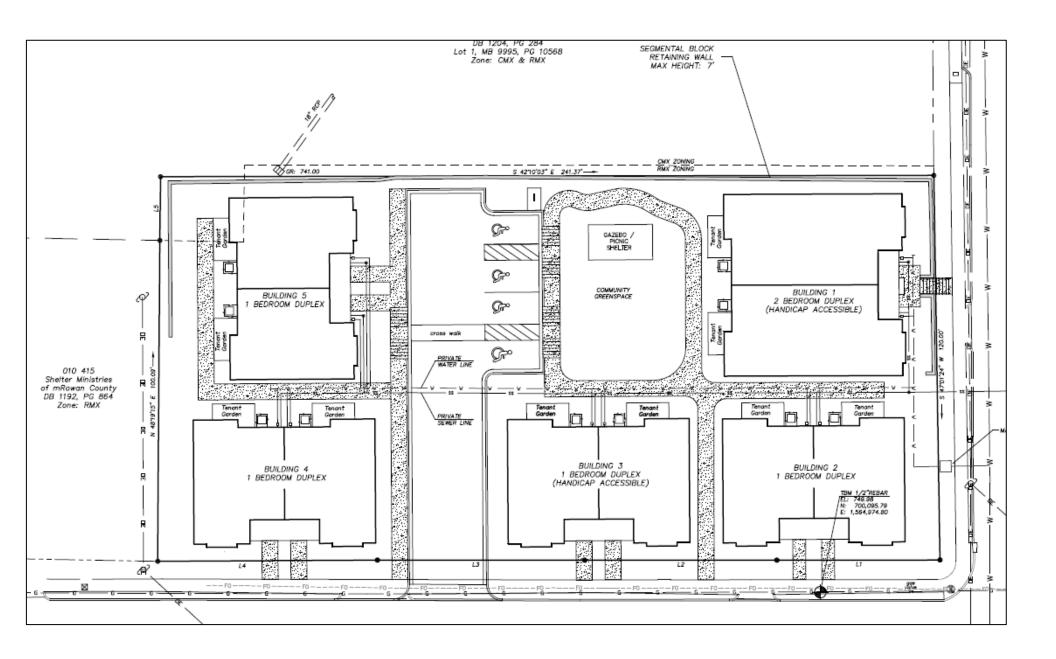

The Salisbury Planning Board held its regular meeting on Tuesday, November 14, 2023, at 4:00 p.m. with the following being present:

WELCOME GUESTS AND VISITORS

John Schaffer, Chair, called the Planning Board meeting to order at 4:00 p.m.

APPROVAL OF MINUTES

Planning Board Minutes of August 8, 2023 were approved by Members present.

NEW BUSINESS

Z-02-2023, 410 West Jake Alexander Boulevard; Applicant: John Leatherman

Request

The applicant is requesting to rezone three properties along West Jake Alexander Blvd. from Residential Mixed-Use (RMX) with a General Development Overlay to Corridor Mixed-Use (CMX) with no overlay.

Staff Presentation

Victoria Bailiff presented the request to the Board and noted that the proposal is for general zoning purposes only. It is not a conditional district zoning request; therefore, all uses of the requested CMX zoning will be permitted. Staff recommends approval, as it is consistent with the goals, objectives, and policies of the Forward 2040 Comprehensive Plan.

In response to questions from the board, Ms. Bailiff clarified that most nearby tenants along Jake Alexander Blvd are non-residential, and that commercial uses in the RMX district are somewhat limited. The applicant is interested in building a drive through coffee shop in that location, and the overlay will not affect that use. Notices were sent to properties within 250 feet of the applicant's property, as required by the ordinance. This is above and beyond state requirements for notification.

Regarding the consequences of additional traffic on neighbors, Ms. Bailiff explained that since Jake Alexander Blvd. is not a city street, traffic signal timing is addressed by NC DOT.

Applicant Comment

Mr. Leatherman provided a history of development in that area, i.e., alignment of the light at the Castlewood neighborhood, to service new development. He emphasized the request's consistency with the Forward 2040 Comprehensive Plan, and named local businessmen who are supportive of the project. He will submit a site plan for staff review prior to construction. Mr. Leatherman invited neighbors to a meeting, but no one attended. He feels a drive through coffee shop would be a good addition to the area.

Public Comment

Mark Odin commented that he is against the project, unless traffic is addressed. He is the owner of Hearing Solutions of NC, a neighbor of the property. The private road/alley behind the businesses, which includes the applicant's property, already has traffic and garbage issues due to the Taco Bell, and Mr. Odin fears the problem will be exacerbated with the addition of another business.

Donald Osbourne commented that the company he works for, Alan Burke, CPA, also a neighbor, is against the project. Their building is next door to the property, and they successfully fought a previous plan to build a Zaxby's restaurant in this location, due to traffic flow. Mr. Osbourn also recounted the Covid testing site that was shut down by the city due to traffic issues. He feels the current zoning is correct and should not change.

Janice Roy, representing the Pinnacle medical offices, also commented against the project. They are concerned that excess traffic will have a negative impact on patient transport and ambulance access to their offices. She clarified the employee parking process and location for the board. Ms. Roy feels this is not an appropriate growth plan.

Paul Radziewicz commented against the project. He lives on the other side of the access road, and already experiences loud noise and garbage issues due to customers and delivery trucks that use the road.

Jerry Wood, the president of the property owner's association that includes the applicant, commented that he is concerned about property values due to continued development. He would not say whether he was in favor of the project or not, only that he is a friend and colleague of the applicant. Mr. Wood asked the board to consider the possibility of closing the road in question to through traffic. He feels that is a possibility, however, after extensive discussion, Mr. Leatherman clarified that the alley cannot be blocked.

Mr. Leatherman explained that trees have been planted by the association as a buffer to the residences on the other side of the alley.

Jill Radziewicz lives behind the property, and is against the project. She contends people are throwing trash from the alley over the fence into her yard, and fears more of that type of behavior.

Ms. Bailiff read email comments received prior to the meeting:

Mark Beymer, Past Chair, Salisbury Planning Board (2008-2009) – "I am writing to endorse the rezoning of Mr. John Leatherman's property at 410 W. Jake Alexander Blvd., Salisbury, NC. Tax ID: 061-210, 221, 222

For some time I have believed that this section of development along Jake Alexander, including the property owned by Mr. John Leatherman should qualify for rezoning. The commercial nature of the property developed on the west (opposite) side of Jake Alexander Blvd. together with the existing traffic light at Castleberry Drive should allow for some commercial mixed use of the property (CMX) other than the existing zoning (RMX). I recommend that the zoning be changed to CMX. The change in zoning should not negatively impact the existing service businesses locate on the east side of Jake Alexander Blvd. nor the residential community behind these properties."

Victor Wallace – "I am writing in support of the petitioner, John and Joan Leatherman, for this rezoning request. The request to rezone these parcels to CMX is in keeping with the realities on the ground. The petitioner's properties are a stop lighted intersection fronted by a 6 lane, medianed highway that carries approximately 32,000 cars per day. Highways 601, 52, and 150 all converge in this area moving traffic in all directions. The area was originally zoned RDX (sic), with a development overlay to protect the adjacent housing community from the commercial growth that this traffic would inevitably generate. We are well past this time, as the housing community has thrived and is protected by the buffer of a fence and thick tree growth. The true zoning for this property is CMX, just like the parcels across the street and at the intersection of Jake Alexander and Hwy 150. The existing office development lives in harmony with the two nationally branded fast foods (Pizza Hut/Taco Bell), as well as, a bank (Truist) with 3 drive thrus and an ATM lane. The office development will also continue to thrive regardless of the additional uses available to the petitioner under CDX (sic) zoning. This whole area is actually living proof that all types of commercial and residential can exist in close proximity successfully....right out of the Forward 2040 Plan!"

James Stringfield, 1228 Maxwell Street, Salisbury – "I am writing in support of Mr. John Leatherman's request to rezone three parcels from Residential Mixed-Use (RMX) with a General Development Overlay to Corridor Mixed -Use (CMX). This request is consistent with out city's Forward 2040 Comprehensive Plan. Given that your staff has recommended approval of this request, I see no reason to deny it. Thank you for your consideration of my request.

Samantha Houston, 704A W Jake Alexander Boulevard – "I fully support this."

Deliberation

Members discussed how the community has thrived under the current zoning district, and how that would change under the proposed one. They questioned the argument made by Mr. Wallace regarding the reasoning for the RMX zone, and how evidence points to the current district as the reason for the area's success. Mr. Post spoke to his concerns about ambulance access and other justifications for his personal opposition to the request.

Ms. Bailiff reviewed the permitted commercial uses for both zoning districts, as well as their consistency with the comprehensive plan.

Consistency Statement

Jon Post made a motion: "The City of Salisbury Planning Board finds that the map amendment requested in petition Z-02-2023 **is consistent** with the goals and policies of the adopted Forward 2040 Comprehensive Plan."

Dennis Rogers seconded the motion. All members present voted AYE.

Recommendation to City Council

Jon Post made a motion: "Having reviewed the proposed amendment, the Comprehensive Plan, and considered information from City Staff, comments from the applicant and other persons, the City of Salisbury Planning Board finds that the map amendment requested in petition Z-02-2023 is **NOT reasonable**, therefore, the Planning Board recommends **DENIAL** of the request,"

Larry Cartner seconded the motion. Members present approved the recommendation with a vote of 5-1.

Request

The applicant is requesting to rezone one property from RMX and CMX with a conditional district overlay to RMX with a conditional district overlay to accommodate a 10-unit campus style development.

Staff Presentation

Ms. Bailiff informed the board that the master plan has been reviewed by TRC. The plan was recommended after minor revisions were satisfied by the applicant. She verified parking logistics, namely, the low number of spaces. Staff and TRC are satisfied with parking arrangements.

Applicant Comment

Elizabeth Trick, with Bogle Firm Architecture, explained that this will be transitional housing from the shelter to private. All units were designed to be ADA accessible, which required the

four ADA parking spaces. Four units are fully wheelchair accessible. The firm wanted to provide additional amenities in place of extra parking.

Chris Bradshaw, of Bogle Firm, also explained they had considered reducing the footprint to accommodate more parking, but the grant required specific square footage. The additional units improved their grant profile.

Public Comment

None.

Deliberation

Jon Post recused himself from this case, as his wife is a member of the Rowan Helping Ministries board.

The board had no concerns regarding the design alternatives requested.

Consistency Statement

David Midgley made a motion: "The City of Salisbury Planning Board finds that the map amendment requested in petition CD-04-2023 **is consistent** with the goals and policies of the adopted Forward 2040 Comprehensive Plan."

Dennis Rogers seconded the motion. All members present voted AYE.

Recommendation to City Council

John Struzick made a motion: "Having reviewed the proposed amendment, the Comprehensive Plan, and considered information from City Staff, comments from the applicant and other persons, the City of Salisbury Planning Board finds that the map amendment requested in petition CD-04-2023 is reasonable and in the public interest, therefore, the Planning Board recommends **APPROVAL** of the request,"

Larry Cartner seconded the motion. All members present voted AYE.
