Sign Up To Steer Salisbury

Residents are invited to apply to the City's 14 active, standing boards and commissions created and appointed by Salisbury City Council. Boards and commissions are made up of volunteer positions to help guide Salisbury's present and future.

Board terms are staggered for three-year terms, and most end on Sunday, March 31. Applicants must be 18 and a Salisbury resident, with some exceptions. Online applications are accepted on a continual basis and kept on file for consideration in the event a vacancy occurs.

Budget Process For City Begins

City departments kicked off the upcoming budget year, Wednesday, Jan. 30, in preparation for the next fiscal year. Fiscal Year 2025 (FY2025) is the city's budget year that will run from July 1, 2024 through June 30, 2025. The adopted budget ordinance will set the new tax rate and city fees.

Over the next few months, managers and supervisors will start to anticipate and estimate next year's city projects, which are then reviewed by City Manager Jim Greene and the city's finance staff, led by Finance Director Wade Furches. Salisbury City Council must receive the first draft of the FY2025 budget from the city manager by June 1, 2024.

Residents will be invited by City Council to weigh in on the FY2025 budget during a general budget session and a public hearing in the next few months. City Council usually holds at least one budget work session to discuss the budget in detail. Watch for budget meetings and public hearing dates here in the Lamplighter and on the city's social media platforms.

The budget will be adopted by Council before June 30.



Protect Your Pipes This Winter

As temperatures continue to dip, now is the time to start thinking about the possibility of pipes freezing in your home. Frozen water pipes are a problem that can happen in homes with both plastic and copper pipes. Learn how to prevent water pipes from freezing and avoid significant property damage:



1. Insulate pipes in unheated spaces, such as a crawlspace, attic, or basement.

2. Remove and drain hoses from outdoor spigots. If there is a shutoff valve specifically for an outdoor spigot, turn the valve to the off position, open the spigot, and drain any water remaining in the spigot and pipe downstream of the shut-off valve.

3. You can also let cold water drip from the faucet served by exposed pipes. Running water through the pipe - even at a trickle - helps prevent pipes from freezing.



4. Sign-up for EyeOnWater: As the temperatures rise, pipes frozen by the low temperatures will begin to thaw which can lead to pipe leaks. Residents can sign-up for the City's free, secure service "EyeOnWater alerts" to track water usage and discover leaks long before they result in high bills or thousands of gallons of wasted water.
