The Salisbury Customer Service Center (CSC) offers a number of electronic ways to pay utility bills since this period of social distancing has forced the closure of the CSC lobby and in-person payments. With limited face-to-face interactions, now is a perfect opportunity to embrace the different types of technology available today.

The following methods are free, secure, quick and easy, allowing residents to make payments from the comfort of their home:

Pay Online

- Create an account and pay online at salisburync.gov/pay.

One-Time Payments (Online)

- Make a one-time payment online at salisburync.gov/pay. No registration required - Must have 14-digit account number including

Pay-By-Text

- Register at salisburync.gov/pay and receive monthly statement via text and pay instantly.

- Register at salisburync.gov/pay with debit, credit cards or checking information.

- at (704) 638-5300, 24 hours per day, 7 days per week.
- Check, debit, credit cards are accepted.
- Press Option 1 to make a payment.
- Routing number and bank account information needed for check

Sign up for EFT (Direct Debit)

- Requires authorization form and voided check submitted one time to Customer Service via the drive-thru, 10 a.m. to 2 p.m.

- Payment will be drafted on the 10th of every month (or next Business Day if the 10th is a weekend or Holiday).

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– Bill pay through your bank (check with your bank for details).





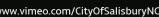

BlockWork Will Return This Fall

The Salisbury Community Appearance Commission and Salisbury Housing Advocacy Commission will be accepting BlockWork applications from Salisbury city neighborhoods beginning now through Friday, June 12. The 2020

> BlockWork event has been set for Saturday, Oct. 24, on, "National Make a Difference Day."

BlockWork is a grassroots neighborhood improvement project that strives to bring residents and community volunteers together to build cleaner and safer neighborhoods, one block at a time. On Make a Difference Day each year the City of Salisbury barricades

one to two blocks in the City for BlockWork. The day is made to be an intense workday by volunteers which includes urban improvements, carpentry, landscaping, painting, other exterior home improvements, and general clean up in a one-block area. Long-term maintenance responsibility is assumed by block property owners, residents, and neighborhood participants. Citizens of Salisbury may apply for any block or blocks within the city limits. Block applications are evaluated based on demonstrated need, neighborhood willingness to participate, and potential

impact on the surrounding community.

BlockWork was developed in 2010 by the Community Appearance Commission's Neighborhood Leaders Alliance (NLA). Eight successful BlockWork events have been held since its founding, including the initial event on S. Shaver St., which earned a National Make a Difference Day award and a \$10,000 prize. Last year, volunteers worked in the 900 block of North Main Street in partnership with the Salisbury Community Development Corporation and the Historic Salisbury Foundation.

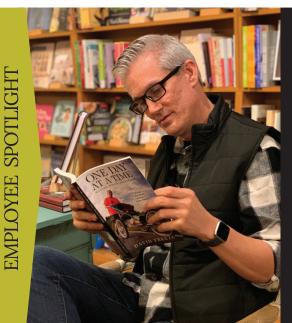
