

## City of Salisbury & Partners Aim To Boost Minority and Women-Owned Businesses

Salisbury recently partnered with multiple service organizations to provide increased financial opportunities for small, minority, and women-owned businesses in the community. The Kiva and 1MBB programs each provide funding for business start-ups, and in some cases, already established companies in Salisbury.



Self-Help Credit Union offers the Kiva program which expands safe and affordable loan options for small business borrowers who may not have access to traditional resources. Through a partnership between Salisbury, Self-Help, the city of Statesville and Livingstone College, Kiva Piedmont North Carolina is a creative new way for businesses owned by women and people of color to finance loans up to \$15,000. Interested borrowers should apply at kiva.com/borrow. If approved, Salisbury residents can benefit from matching dollar-for-dollar grants from City Council.

## Bike Safety Tips



For Cyclists:

For Drivers:

Riding a bike is fun, healthy and an environmentally friendly form of transportation. As we celebrate National Bike Month, the Pedal Factory and Salisbury Parks and Recreation Department share some tips for safe and happy riding:



1) Wear a helmet! It should fit properly; with little movement and sit level on the forehead. Helmets are legally required for all riders 16 and under.



2) Be visible! Bright clothing, lights and reflectors can help increase your visibility on the road. Use front and rear blinking lights anytime you're riding - whether day or night.



3) Remember the ABC Quick Check each time you ride: Air in your tires / Make sure Brakes are working/ Check the Chain & Cassette for wear / Be sure Quick Releases are tightened.



4) Stay alert! Watch for parked cars, opening doors, and hazards on the road. Be aware of your surroundings by listening and looking.



5) Be predictable! Use hand signals to announce your turns to traffic. Say "On your left" as you pass pedestrians and other cyclists.

Be a safe and friendly driver! Take these tips from the Pedal Factory and Salisbury Parks and Recreation Department to help keep our roads safe for everyone.



1) People on bikes have the same legal rights and responsibilities to use the road.



2) Change lanes when you are passing a bike. Wait until it is clear to safely pass giving at least 3-6 feet of space.



3) Look in your mirror or over your shoulder before opening your door when parallel parking. Doors can become a fatal hazard for cyclists.



4) Take your time. Crashes involving cars and bikes often leave cyclists with serious injuries or death. It is not worth destroying a life to save a few seconds.





#### Nominate A Neighborhood For BlockWork by June 11, 2021

Now's the chance to submit a Salisbury neighborhood for BlockWork, a grass-roots program developed in 2010 to beautify Salisbury neighborhoods. BlockWork neighborhood applications within City of Salisbury limits will be accepted through Friday, June 11, by the Community Appearance Commission and Housing Advocacy Commission.

The 2021 BlockWork event has been set for Saturday, October 23, on, "National Make a Difference Day." The event strives to bring residents and community volunteers together to build cleaner and safer neighborhoods, one block at a time. Projects include carpentry, painting, landscaping and general clean-up in a one-block area. Long-term maintenance responsibility is assumed by block property owners, residents, and neighborhood participants.

and coordinates and instructs state approved Wastewater Operator Schools for SRU staff.


