Transit Wants To Hear From You

Salisbury Transit has partnered with AECOM, a transportation planning and engineering firm, to provide a comprehensive long-range public transportation master plan for its transportation system. The ultimate focus of the project is to improve the City of Salisbury's fixed-route and demand-responsive services and engage the public to determine a strategic focus to meet the needs of the Salisbury community in the next 20 years. Included in project is the understanding of the overall ridership, ystem satisfaction, rider and population demographics, as well as development patterns and plans within the service areas and the surrounding communities.

As part of the long-range planning, community survey, available in Enligh and Spanish, will be provided online at salisburync.gov/TransitSurvey.

The intent is to gain as much local community feedback as possible in order to craft a plan that will meet the Salisbury Transit System mobility needs.



New Tool Keeps An Eye On Water

Salisbury-Rowan Utilities (SRU) announces the full launch of a new, free web-based customer service tool called EyeOnWater. EyeOnWater gives customers their water usage data gathered by SRU's "smart meters" in near real time so they can manage their accounts down to the week, day, or even

Perhaps the most useful feature of EyeOnWater is its Leak Alert tool. Customers can set up their account to warn them if their usage runs high, allowing them to quickly catch potentially expensive leaks.

EyeOnWater is easy to view, understand, and use. Clean icons and bar graphs clearly break down a customer's

Registered SRU customers can see their consumption and immediately adjust their usage to lower their bills.







The HRC consists of sixteen (16) members, eight to be appointed by the City Council of Salisbury and eight to be appointed by the Human Relations Council.

Salisbury's Community Appearance Commission (CAC) members recently selected winners for the 14th annual Holiday Storefront Decorations Awards. The event celebrates downtown merchants whose window displays best capture the

The jury of CAC members viewed over 45 seasonal displays created by downtown businesses. The CAC selected eight awards to recognize the seasonal creativity of ten different shopkeepers.

Maison Monroe, at 105 W. Innes St. was a unanimous choice for The Best Overall Award for its quintessentially southern display using dried hydrangeas and Spanish moss complemented by shades of pale aqua and twinkling lights to capture the soft glamour of the season.

This season's Classical Elegance award goes to both Tonyan Grace and Caniche, both located in the 200 block of South Main St. Lora Belle Baby and Skinny Wheels tied for the

Christmas in Motion award. The Silent Night award goes to the peaceful display of a willow bower trimmed with twinkling lights and set for a nighttime toast at Salisbury Wine Shop. Southern Sass, next to the Meroney Theatre, is this year's winner of the Best Nighttime Display. The jury awarded the Taking Time for Christmas award to Walser Tech Group for its window showing the personality of the business.

Faced with the challenge of choosing between long established entrants and multiple new competitors, the group decided to honor The Lettered Lily and Textile Products with the Christmas by Design award.

Each year the Commission delights in recognizing business owners whose displays encourage investment in downtown Salisbury and continue to enhance our economy. Winners will be honored for their contributions at the CAC's Biennial Awards
