Plan and Practice During Fire Prevention Week!

Salisbury Fire Department will join the national campaign to celebrate Fire Prevention Week, Sunday, Oct. 6 through Saturday, Oct. 12.

The theme of the 2019 Fire Prevention Week campaign is: "Not Every Hero Wears a Cape. Plan and Practice Your Escape!" The goal is to educate people of all ages about the small but important actions they can take to keep themselves and those around them safe.

Here are a few fire escape instructions to keep you and your family safe:

- Draw a map of your home with all members of your household, marking two exits from each room and a path to the outside from each exit.
- Practice your home fire drill twice per year. Conduct one at night and one during the day with everyone in your home, and practice using different ways out.
- Teach children how to escape on their own in case you can't help them.
- Make sure the number of your home is clearly marked and easy for the fire department to find.
- Close doors behind you as you leave this may slow the spread of smoke, heat, and fire.
- Once you get outside, stay outside. Never go back inside a burning building.
- Install smoke alarms in every bedroom, outside each sleeping area, and on every level of the home including the basement.

IMPROVING THE FUTURE HEALTH OF CITY PARK LAKE

City Park Lake is on track for a major rehabilitation project set to begin in the upcoming months that will lead to extensive work in the area, road closures and anticipated noise.

Residents' concerns about the lake's appearance have coincided with parks and recreation and public services



staff's plan to ramp up the lake's cleaning. The last time the lake was dredged with major repairs was in 1996.

Built in 1936, the lake's original design depth was eight feet in the creek channel and an average depth of six feet throughout most of the lake. Today the depth is around 4 feet due to the abundance of sediment, Hydrilla (which is the most resistant aquatic species to treatment) and String Algae. Previously the lake has been treated for these invasive aquatic weeds both biologically and chemically annually.

Dragonfly Pond Works won the bid last month to mechanically "dredge" the lake remove the weeds, sediment buildup and additional soil to increase the depth of the lake. This will also allow staff the ability to make needed repairs to the dam. In addition, the latest plans call for nstallation of a walkway around the lake and a pier to make the lake a destination



Be Ready To Vote In the 2019 Municipal Election

The 2019 Municipal Election is approaching fast and with that, another important deadline will be here before we know it. That important date is Friday, Oct. 11. If you have not registered to vote by then, you will not be eligible to vote in the Municipal Election being held on Tuesday, Nov. 5. Absentee Voting By-Mail:

Friday, Oct. 4, starts absentee voting by-mail in Rowan County. The last day to request an absentee ballot by mail is Tuesday, Oct. 29. Early Voting:

The Rowan County Board of Elections office located at 1935 W. Jake Alexander Blvd. (West End Plaza) will be the (1) one-stop early voting site for the 2019 municipal election. Any registered voter in Rowan County is welcome to take advantage of the early voting site. The Board of Elections office will be open Monday through Friday from 7 a.m. – 7 p.m. beginning on Wednesday, Oct. 16, through Friday, Nov. 1. The site will also open on Saturday, Oct. 26, from 9 a.m. - 2 p.m. You will not be able to vote at the Board of Elections office on Election Day -- you will be required to go to your registered polling place.
