## SPD Unveils New Center

The Salisbury Police Department (SPD) recently debuted its new Rowan Regional Crime Information Center (RRCIC), a law enforcement hub which enables Rowan County agencies to more closely monitor and help solve crime incidents. The RRCIC boasts views of public and private camera systems and shared record management systems among agencies. The Center provides one central location for officers and analysts to hone their skills and use social networking and crime pattern data to support investigations.

Chief Stokes said, "Our ability to track and monitor for crime incidents, patterns, and trends through the technology and analytics in the RRCIC will be most beneficial for law enforcement in Rowan County. The center will continue to build on the strong relationship and collaboration we have with the Rowan County Sheriff's Office and the other police agencies in the county which benefits our citizens.'

The RRCIC was made possible by a \$500,000 Strategies in Policing Innovation grant offered by the Bureau of Justice Assistance - US Department of Justice.

BlockWork is a grass-roots program developed in 2010 by the Community Appearance Commission's Neighborhood Leaders Alliance (NLA). The event strives to bring residents and community volunteers together to build cleaner and safer neighborhoods, one block at a time. Projects include carpentry, painting, landscaping and general clean-up in a one-block area. Long-term maintenance responsibility is assumed by block property owners, residents, and neighborhood participants.

The event relies heavily on sponsors, in-kind donations, and the generosity of local businesses and volunteers. To receive recognition and funding from Lowes means we can take on larger projects than in a typical year. We are truly honored and appreciative. The 100 Hometowns program will complete 100 projects across 37 states that rebuild areas reeling from natural disasters, repair critical housing, restore beloved community centers, and revive green spaces.
