# City Employees Give to Improve Lives in Rowan

The City of Salisbury has exceeded its goal for the 2019 Rowan County United Way campaign. The theme of this year's campaign was "Fire It up For Change."

"Thanks to our city team effort, and with Chief Bob Parnell leading the way for the entire Rowan County effort, we were able to help further Rowan County United Way's mission," said City Manager W. Lane Bailey. "A challenge was issued and city employees fired it up to go above and beyond in their giving. Employees' participation in the campaign displayed our commitment of wanting to be involved and give back to not only Salisbury residents but to everyone in Rowan County. Rowan County Emergency Services responded to 963 substance abuse and mental health emergency calls from January to September, which prompted the city to change its goal from \$50,000 to \$50,963. Once the goal was set, department directors and department liaisons encouraged fundraising efforts through payroll deduction, fundraising events and donation challenges spanning weeks. City employees increased their pledge donations and raised more than \$53,000 for United Way.



## Newsome Road Project

Salisbury City Council last month approved a construction contract to begin work on the highly-anticipated Newsome Road project. Expected to start in February 2020, the project will include a widened roadway on both sides, repaving, a sidewalk, bike lanes, and ditch removal to make way for new curbs and gutters.

"Newsome Road is considered an important roadway in Salisbury," said Wendy Brindle, the city's Engineering Director. "Not only does it connect Stokes Ferry and Bringle Ferry Roads, but is also the only connection between these two roads within the city limits. Bringle Ferry Road is a major thoroughfare to High Rock Lake and Dan Nicholas Park, and because of its connection, the road receives a lot of traffic. The widening and resurfacing will be a noticeable improvement to travelers and residents."

Some years ago the City was granted federal Congestion Mitigation Air Quality (CMAQ) money to complete projects in Salisbury, such as sidewalks on Bringle Ferry Road, South Main Street, and near the mall. Newsome Road is the final project from the early applications.

Due to the complexity of the project and its federal funding source, the construction plans had to meet certain criteria before being granted permission to proceed. Those targets included design approval, right-of-way acquisition, Duke Energy support, environmental considerations and NCDOT

Residents should expect limited travel lanes along Newsome Road, along with detours, allowing for local access to homes along the road. Construction is expected to last just over one year, weather dependent. For more information, please call Engineering at (704) 638-5200.



There is no better way to celebrate New Year's Eve than by ringing in the new year with your family, friends, and neighbors at this community event.




## Sip On Local Flavors At **Wine About Winter**
