# Five Honored With EDK Award

Five Salisburians were honored last month at the annual Elizabeth Duncan Koontz (EDK) Humanitarian Awards held at the Salisbury Civic Center. Honorees Edward and Susan Norvell, Emily Jean Perry, Jason Walser and David Whisenant were among the 10 residents and organizations nominated this year for their dedication to the community.

"The Norvells were raised in Rowan County, and have devoted their lives to giving unselfishly," said their joint nomination form. "Susan Norvell has worked on many projects that have benefitted through her philanthropy and Ed has held over 50 leadership positions in the community. As a husband and wife team, they have given to numerous projects and organizations."

Perry is a retired social worker, who is noted for her work as a community organizer and activist. Perry, a Salisbury native, is a graduate of Boyden High School and Shaw University. After retirement from the District of Columbia Hospital, she returned to Salisbury and immersed herself in Salisbury and Rowan community activities.

Whisenant, also a native of Salisbury, was a local bureau reporter for WBTV in Charlotte. He recently retired after 32 years. "David is a blessing to our community..." said his nomination. "He was able to use his platform to address social issues and to offer solutions for people in need, including his advocacy for suicide prevention."

Walser, executive director of Blanche and Julian Robertson Family Foundation, was nominated because he is "...the go-to person for support, honesty, guidance & direction. He has made a significant impact in our community by working to improve education, business, civic engagement, advocacy and community relations."

# **Busy Summer For Street Paving**

The City of Salisbury Public Works Department's paving project is in full swing. While the City of Salisbury works to enhance our roads, please plan to expect delays in paving areas, travel cautiously, and observe lane closures. City Manager Jim Greene presented his recommended fiscal year 2024-2025 (FY25) budget to City Council at a budget work session meeting last month.

The recommended city budget of \$119,746,878 includes a recommended general fund of \$68,053,759. The balanced budget includes a property tax recommendation of \$0.665 per \$100 of valuation, a 4.9 cent increase from last year's tax rate of \$0.616. For the upcoming fiscal year, the tax value for a home with an average value of \$231,685, taxes would be \$1,541, an increase of \$114 which is equivalent to \$9.50 per month over last year. Greene's recommended tax rate will fund initiatives related to City Council's strategic plan priorities, such as an improved employee compensation package, new positions to support growth, capital investments and public safety.

To support Salisbury-Rowan Utilities infrastructure costs, a proposed 3.5% rate increase to water and sewer rates is recommended for FY25.

Two major stormwater projects on Marsh Street and Eaman Park are targeted in this proposed budget for FY25 and funded through Stormwater's Capital Improvement Plan (CIP). Greene proposes a new rate of \$5.29 -- an increase of 10 percent or 48 cents per month to support plan implementation.

Growth continues to impact city services, including solid waste. This budget includes funding for an additional solid waste staff and trash truck to help reduce safety concerns from a high-volume operation, overtime hours, job stress and additional collection points. With this request and increases in the city's recycling contract, a rate increase of \$2.29 per month for solid waste and 48 cents per month for recycling has been requested.

A public hearing about the budget will be held on Tuesday, June 4, at 6 p.m. at the regular City Council meeting. This meeting is open to the public and also can be viewed via the City's live stream at www.salisburync.gov/webcast or the City's Facebook account at https://facebook.com/CitySalisburyNC. 
