Will Salisbury Rise To The Challenge?

Salisbury needs your help for the city nature challenge April 26-29.

The City of Salisbury will join cities around the world in a friendly competition to see which area has the most nature-engaged residents. The 2019 City Nature Challenge will start on Friday, April 26, at 12:01 a.m. and end on Monday, April 29, at 11:59 p.m. This challenge calls on nature and science fans of all ages to observe and submit pictures of wild plants, animals and fungi using the free app iNaturalist or the iNaturalist website (www.inaturalist.org) Identification of photographed species will be crowdsourced through the online community Tuesday, April 30 - Sunday, May 5, and results will be announced on Monday, May 6.

"We are pleased to participate in the City Nature Challenge," said Salisbury Parks and Recreation Director Nick Aceves. "This is an opportunity for our residents to go outside and explore nature by walking on trails, experience our parks and is a great program to partner with other parks and recreation departments like Cabarrus County. The collection of data submitted by our residents will assist scientists, educators and urban planners to ensure we acknowledge, study and protect plants and animals for future generations to enjoy."

This year, the Challenge is expanding and will include more than 60 cities from 17 countries, including Charlotte metro region areas: Rowan, Cleveland, Lincoln, Gaston, Mecklenburg, Iredell, Cabarrus,

Cheerwine Festival Will Be A "Smashing" Good Time

The third annual Cheerwine Festival is around the corner! Soon, Downtown Salisbury will be filled with diverse musical acts for festivalgoers to enjoy throughout the day on Saturday, May 18, from noon to 10 p.m., all to celebrate Cheerwine, Salisbury's 102-year-old, family-owned soft drink.

If engagement on social media is any indication, attendance at next month's Cheerwine Festival is expected to exceed its 2018 number. Having recently shared this year's music headliner, Smash Mouth, the Cheerwine Festival Facebook event page already has surpassed the total engagement of the 2018 event (the Saturday, May 18th Facebook event page title is 3rd Annual Cheerwine Festival).

According to a recent press announcement, multi-platinum band, Smash Mouth, will take the Hotwire Communications Stage as the Cheerwine Festival musical headliner. Smash Mouth is known for blockbuster hits such as "Walking on the Sun," "All-Star," and "I'm a Believer," as featured in the movie, "Shrek."

In addition to Smash Mouth and other locally-known stage acts, the festival also will include 12 to 16 "buskers," also known as street entertainers, providing music on sidewalks and other locations within the festival footprint. Musicians, including Blazin' Blues Bob, Lucas Beam and Lisette Rodriguez, will entertain families along Main and Innes Streets.

Salisbury can expect a family-friendly, daylong festival complete with a variety of musical entertainment, activities for children, a food area jam-packed with brands native to Carolina, and of course, ice-cold Cheerwine. Salisbury Locals Receive Humanitarian Awards

Three Salisbury Rowan county residents have received the coveted 2019 Elizabeth Duncan Koontz Humanitarian Award. Myles Cannon, Meredith Williams and Ola Nwafor were honored Thursday, Feb. 26, at the annual celebratory dinner at the Civic Center.

Cannon, a 17-year-old student at Rowan County Early College, is a Salisbury native who is noted for his involvement in the community. At school, Cannon is an active member of the Student Government Association, National Honor Society and the vearbook committee.

He also is a member of the Juvenile Crime Prevention Council, the Rowan Connection Mentoring Program and the Hurley YMCA Black Achievers.

Cannon will attend college in the fall, with plans to continue his education at law school.

"I am genuinely ecstatic about getting this award and it's a great honor...." said Cannon. "It means a lot to me because Elizabeth Duncan Koontz left a big legacy...I feel like this is a good starting point for me to possibly achieve what I want to do and leave my mark... and contribute to and a community of dedicated the pace that I came from."

Williams is the principal at North Rowan High School. A lifelong Rowan County resident, she graduated from North Rowan High School, and has degrees from UNC Chapel Hill and Wake Forest University. She has dedicated her life to education, first

as an English teacher in Thailand and studying education in Tanzania and Zambia, second as a NC public school employee and finally, as principal of North Rowan for the past three years.

Her nominator said, "Meredith Williams, raised in the North Rowan community, returned home with a desire to ensure that all students receive an extraordinary education and are prepared for an evolving future...she has created a learning experience where all students are challenged and have the opportunity to be successful. Students learn how to collaborate, communicate, think critically, and be creative ... "

"It's such a humbling experience," Williams said of the award. "The work that we do at North High is certainly not only my work. It's that of a whole staff of dedicated teachers stakeholders."

Nwafor, also a Salisbury native, holds a bachelor's degree from Catawba College and a master's degree from Strayer University in health administration. After completing the 2016 City of Salisbury Citizen's Academy, she founded

the Born Leader Club, a 501(c)(3) organization dedicated to providing leadership development, one-on-one mentorship and advocacy for middle schoolers from single parent homes. Born Leaders receive support through the encouragement of emotional, social and physical growth and career preparation in order to become contributing members of society.

According to her nomination form, "Nwafor not only funded the 501(c) (3) process out of her own pocket, but also pays for many of the club activities herself, recruits, trains and supervises mentors and is working to raise more funds so she can bring more members into the club."

"It's an honor for me to receive this award because this is a very special award," said Nwafor. "[I] try to build Salisbury...and do whatever I can to uplift the youth and to help them follow their dreams like someone helped me. So I really wake up to give back. All day. Everyday."

Each winner of the EDK Humanitarian Award received a recognition plaque.
